

PlayStation @ Installation into 2007 Toyota Prius Package #2. Martin Isaac, March 15, 2008

On my 2007 package 2, I was very bummed that the screen in the front (called the MFD or Multi Function Display) only showed me the limited information that it did. I decided that I would like to put in a DVD player and started asking around at auto shops for some recommendations. At a Best Buy, The sales clerk recommended that I forgoe the 100-200 car DVD player and put in a game system. "What a great idea! Especially because I have one sitting in the bottom of my closet!" So I've set to work.

After Installing [Audio/Video Lockpick](#) I set out putting the PS2 into place. I decided on the glovebox for easiest access. Here's the glove box removed and ready for surgery.



The problem was that this internal lip (designed to store your owners manual) was taking up the space I needed.



I started by removing all the screws, then separating the box from the base.





After separating the two pieces, I started working on the bottom half by removing the fins that hold that shelf in place.

Then, I began working on the shelf itself. This is actually a V shaped piece and I needed to remove half of the V. The plastic is a little thicker so I cut out each fin individually on the inside (hidden) first, then I cut on the visible side. Once all the fins were cut and the visible side was scored and cut, I cut along the seam of the V

and the shelf came right off. I kept the shelf (it comes out in one piece after all that cutting and could be reinstalled with a little hot glue).



A perfect Fit!





NEXT, I took everything outside and started running my wires. I had already run the lockpick wires to an RCA extender, and then under the carpet between the front and passenger seats. I ran them into the glove box through a 1" hole drilled under the mat toward the back. I ran them to a RCA input switch which accepts 2 inputs to one output. (this is for iPod Video) I ran the power cable and the RCA to PS2 cables through the same hole. The power is then run into a 150W power inverter in the console. I didn't want to put an inverter that was hardwired in because I didn't want it to be constantly running, or have to run another switch. The wires for the PS2 then run under the carpet and into the glove box.

As you can see, A perfect fit again - with the wireless remote above. (they also fit ontop of the PS2 in the bottom glove box.)
